- Department of Chemistry, College of Letters & Science
- Achieved tenure in 2024
- players connecting metal micronutrients and metabolic function in extracellular space. Her approach and strategies sit at the interface of bioinorganic chemistry, analytical chemistry, chemical biology, metabolic biology, and soil chemistry. Dr. Heffern and her team have specific interests in the interplay between first-row d-block transition metals and hormone function, with longstanding goal of extending our insights to develop therapeutic and diagnostic solutions to endocrine disorders spanning diabetes, liver disease, and cancer.



Marina Radulaski

- Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering, College of Engineering
- Achieved tenure in 2023
- Dr. Radulaski's research focuses on nanophotonics, solid-state quantum optics, color centers, quantum communications, cavity quantum electrodynamics, and photonic architectures. Dr. Radulaski's interdisciplinary research explores the interaction of light and matter at the nanoscale for applications in quantum and classical information processing hardware.



Juan Tellez

- Department of Political Science, College of Letters & Science
- Achieved tenure in 2025
- Dr. Tellez joined UC Davis in 2021. He previously worked as an assistant professor of political science at University of South Carolina. Dr. Tellez is a political scientist whose research interests are at the intersection of political violence and development. His writing has been published or is forthcoming in the American Political Science Review, the Journal of Politics, World Politics, and various other academic and popular press outlets. Dr. Tellez has substantial experience in international development, working on funded research for the World Bank, USAID and other government agencies, in settings like Colombia, Indonesia, Guatemala and Ethiopia.



Benjamin Weber

- Department of African American and African Studies,
 College of Letters & Science
- Achieved tenure in 2024
- Dr. Weber is an interdisciplinary scholar of African **American History, Critical Carceral Studies, and Black** Social and Political Thought. He has been recognized for his research and teaching, including being named the **National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) Outstanding Teacher of the Year for the United States**, receiving an Omni Gold Award for the Calderwood U.S. History Series he hosts on PBS Learning Media, and codirecting Louisiana's contribution to the States of Incarceration national public history project. Dr. Weber authored American Purgatory: Prison Imperialism and the Rise of Mass Incarceration (The New Press, 2023), a fourhundred-year reckoning with the colonial workings of the carceral state and movements seeking to broaden the meaning and experience of freedom.
