Statement of Contributions to Public and Global Impact

(New in MIV for AY 23 -24)

"Academic scholarship includes engaging locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally, but the full breadth and impact of that work is not always appreciated or easily understood by those who evaluate faculty's merit and promotion dossiers. It is currently difficult to understand, visualize, and evaluate the breadth of academic activities that fall under these cross <u>cutting and high</u> -priority areas for the university. These activities span the pillars of research, teaching, and service. As such, this optional statement will provide the opportunity for academics to specifically address areas of public and global impact in their dossier. Public and global impact may be evidenced by, for example: peer -reviewed publications, knowledge being brought into the policy and decision -making process, improving professional practice, pedagogical innovations, public exhibitions/installations, grants, contracts or competitive awards, and ways in which academic public and global impact intersects with efforts to improve diversity, equity, and inclusion."

Why document public and global impact intentionally and systematically using this new statement?

- Think beyond "service"
- Explain the *full impact* of activities across research, teaching, and service
- Make that impact legible to reviewers at all levels



TELL THE STORY OF IMPACT



Cross - Cutting Examples of Public and Global Impact

Research

- Publish with colleagues abroad or with community partners
- Collaborate on research grants or projects with international teams and/or community partners
- Win prestigious awards for global or public scholarship

Teaching

- Design innovative courses with robust global learning or community engaged elements
- Direct internships with international, national, or or local partners
- Mentor students in public and/or globally engaged scholarship

Service

- Influence local, national or international policymaking
- Organize conferences with international or local partners, and/or on the topic of public scholarship
- Serve as UC Davis faculty champion for an agreement with a community-based institution (international, national, or local)


